WHO CAN WORK IN THE UK?

If you want to apply for the Youth Mobility visa, you can find all the information related to your application process on the government website.





UK BANK ACCOUNT

To open a Bank account in England, you will need a proof of address. This can be a letter from your school (if you're staying at one of our partner host families or residences) confirming your UK address.

Many students find it easier to get an account with **an online bank.**Speak Up London does not have a partnership with any of the below banks, but you can list the following list to help you find the right one for you.

TAXATION & NATIONAL INSURANCE

Taxation

The usual tax rate in the UK is 20%. You are able to claim tax back once you leave the country if you stayed under the personal allowance of £12,570 per year. Your employer will also deduct NI (National Insurance) from your pay.

Beware

It is **illegal** to accept "cashin-hand jobs" with no contract.

National Insurance Number

To work in the UK you need a National Insurance Number.
Once you have a job offer, you can apply for an NI number online. You will need a passport and a Biometric Residence Permit (BRP).

Your National Insurance
number is a **unique personal number** allocated to you that
is used to identify you to
government departments. It
ensures any contributions you
make are paid into your NI
account.

You will see NI deductions from your wages on your payslip.

At Speak Up London, we run monthly **Career Club sessions** for students who are interested in applying for jobs in the UK. If you have any questions about your NI number, bank account or wages, bring them to the next Career Club session.



NATIONAL MINIMUM WAGE

This is the **current** National Minimum Wage in the UK, per hour, which updates on **April 1st** every year



CREATING A CV

CV writing

To apply for any job, you will need a CV (Curriculum Vitae, also known as resume in American English).

A CV is usually **one page long** and showcases your education, experience and your achievements in a clear way.

WRITING A COVER LETTER

Cover letter

In the UK, cover letters help you explain to the hiring manager why you are the right person for the job. It's important to personalise your letters to make them stand out from the rest. It's also a good opportunity to give more information about your current situation (for example, if you're studying and working at the same time), your personality and your attitude towards work.
